Thank you members A-L for the variety of snacks this meeting. Board Member Sandra Angelo gave me literature on the 2013 NE AZ Regional Science Fair being held in March in which students will compete with their science projects. Two of our members are directly involved. Maryann Moseley is on the Planning Committee and Rick Olson will be a judge. At this meeting it was voted to contribute \$300 to the Earth Science winner for their expenses to compete at the state level. At the "supporter" level we will receive recognition in all publicity, have a \$25 cash prize given in our name and receive a quarter page ad in the event program. Vice President Nanz Marshall shared information about the Earth Science Museum in Phoenix which has replaced the Mineral & Mining Museum. After discussion it was voted to make a \$300 contribution to the Museum. Both items appear on the proposed budget for 2013 that is located in this publication. The Board prepared the recommended budget, the membership at the meeting approved it, and our final vote will be at the February meeting. Nanz also gave an impromptu educational program on the subject of gem & mineral shows. As a personal note, that is how I got into rockhounding, by attending the Castro Valley, CA club show in 1990. I was fascinated by a display case that showed every step in creating a cabochon from rough to polished gemstone. I was hooked.

Larry presented the budget the Board worked on and any Board member can be contacted if you have questions. We are renewing our \$ 1,000 to the National Forest Foundation for reforestation of Arizona, and renewing our Rocky Mountain Scholarship contribution of \$1,000.

A Board meeting was held at Tonie MonDragon's home on January 5, 2013 to discuss the 2013 budget. Present were Tonie, Nanz Marshall, Larry Legge, Sumner Christie, Rick Olson, Sandra Angelo and Ron Ginn, which constituted a quorum. Edie Christie was also present. The meeting began at 11:40 a.m.

Sumner and Rick presented the proposed list of 2013 field trips for the Board's comment. There was discussion of selecting a month for the Arizona Coalition Trip we will host, and it was suggested we revisit the claims and allow the Coalition members access. It was also suggested Sumner inform the Ranger Station when we visit Pinedale, and have documentation with him regarding the rules for collecting, so as to avoid any problems.

The Board went line by line over the budget for the past two years prepared by Larry Legge. Rick identified new expenses with regard to the upcoming show. After discussion it was suggested we support the NE AZ Regional Science Fair by a \$300 contribution to the expenses of sending the regional winner to the State competition. We will also renew our \$1,000 contribution to the National Forest Foundation for reforestation of Arizona forests, and \$1,000 to the Rocky Mountain Federation Scholarship Fund. We further discussed ideas for merchandising at the annual show. We will plan on selling Rockhound decals and look for another suitable resale item such as a tool or accessory for rockhounding, perhaps a large loupe or portable UV light.

Larry will present the proposed budget at the January meeting and will be published in the newsletter. The final vote will be at the February meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 12:50 p.m.

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING  
JANUARY 6, 2013

The January 2013 meeting was called to order by President MonDragon at 1:20. Guests Melinda and Theo Halsall introduced themselves and identified a list of what they hoped to find in our club. Todd Sharp introduced himself. He has mostly been involved in photography. The membership graciously welcomed the three newcomers.

Nanz Marshall made a motion to accept the minutes as presented in Rock Talk with a second provided by Ruthie King. No additions or corrections were required and the minutes were unanimously approved as presented.

President MonDragon relayed a phone call she had received from Jeanie Arneklev. Stan had surgery and was doing very well. Since Jeanie needed to be with Stan, her presentation on gem trees will have to be rescheduled to a later date.

President MonDragon read the minutes from the Board meeting held on January 5. Board minutes were approved as presented.

Information on the Regional Science Fair was presented by President MonDragon. It was suggested at the Board meeting that our Club should provide some support. Rick Olson will be a judge and MaryAnn Moseley is on the Regional Science Fair Committee.

Members with last names beginning with A-L were thanked for bringing the snacks.

The rocks from our exchange with Arkansas arrived. Everyone who contributed a rock could pick one. Any remaining rocks would be put in the silent auction.

During the education segment of the meeting Nanz will be talking about upcoming shows in the AZ and nearby. She will also talk about the AZ Earth Science Museum.

Larry Legge gave the Treasurer's report for December. Expenses total \$865.31 and income was 0. He then presented the proposed budget for 2013. Some changes were suggested. The 2013 budget will be published in Rock Talk for approval at the February meeting.

Nanz Marshall stated that the Earth Science Museum is officially a 501c3 corporation. Its new home is on Bethany Rd. in Phoenix. This museum replaces the AZ Mining and Mineral Museum. The museum has put together Teacher Kits to assist Arizona teachers in implementing the new science curriculum standards. Two kits at no charge will be provided to each school. Nanz suggested that a line item be placed in the 2013 budget for either a membership or a donation to the museum. One suggestion was that we may want to buy additional kits for our local schools.

Larry Legge made a motion that we designate \$300 in the Special Projects line item for the Earth Science Museum. Sumner Christie provided the second. Motion was approved.

Membership was also reminded that dues are due.

The January field trip will be on the 19th to the Gem & Mineral Show in Globe. We will meet at the K-Mart parking lot at 8 am, with an 8:30 am departure. There will be a stop at Seneca Lake to do some collecting. A list of 10 field trips plus alternate sites, if necessary, will be printed in the January newsletter.

Rick Olson announced that the annual White Mountain Gem and Mineral show will be held on May 25 and 26 at the Hon-Dah Conference Center. Hours will be 9-6 on Saturday and 10-4 on Sunday. Admission is \$2 for adults and anyone under 16 is free when accompanied by an adult. A coupon for \$1 off will be available in our print ads. We should all plan on volunteering, since this is our primary fund-raiser. Volunteer opportunities are 2 hours in duration. Set up will be on the 24th. We have access to the venue all that day. A room will be dedicated for children activities. Eunice will display her 50 States fluorescence collection if she has assistance. We have received contracts from a couple of dealers. 15 to 20 dealers should be in attendance. There are 6 display cases available to highlight collections and specimens.

David Bingell talked about the Northland Art Institute and its upcoming class schedule. David and Malcolm Craft are instructors. The information will be found in the January Newsletter.

After a brief break Nanz Marshall presented the education program. She provided information on upcoming shows and symposiums. Since Nanz has been an attendee at many of these events, she was able to include personal observations and experiences.

### CLEANING MINERALS WITH OXALIC ACID

Here are a few guidelines for using oxalic acid to remove iron stains from minerals like smoky quartz and microcline. First, soak and scrub the mineral thoroughly in water and detergent to remove as much surface dirt as possible. Oxalic acid is a white solid chemical; it dissolves in water to form a solution that is particularly effective at dissolving iron oxides because it forms a soluble iron oxalate complex. The acid is only weakly corrosive but it is a poison if ingested, so handle both the powder and solution with care.

One can either soak minerals in oxalic acid at room temperature, or heat them in hot (not quite boiling) acid. The room temperature treatment usually requires several days, but heated acid will clean specimens in a few hours. I have found that the hot acid seems to do a better job. Richard M. Pearl, in *Cleaning and Preserving Minerals*, recommends using about two tablespoons of oxalic acid crystals per gallon of water, and twice as much for heavily stained material. According to Pearl, wood, aluminum, or enamel containers are all suitable for use with the cold acid. An enamel pan must be free of cracks or holes, or the acid will eat a hole through the iron pan. Pyrex glass is probably the best container for hot acid; I have also used a plastic container held within a metal pot as a "double boiler" for heating specimens in acid. Here is a suggested procedure. Place specimen in cold acid initially (the thermal shock may crack crystals if they are placed in hot acid.)

Heat for an hour or more as required to remove the stain. The acid will turn yellow as it dissolves iron.

Do not allow specimens to cool down in the acid; acid will be drawn into cracks in the specimens and be difficult to remove. Instead, remove specimens into a hot (same temperature to reduce thermal shock) pan of water containing a little baking soda to neutralize the acid on the specimens. Allow this to cool, and brush off any remaining iron oxide which has been loosened but not dissolved.

Finally, rinse in clean water. It may be necessary to repeat the entire procedure for heavily coated specimens.

**Some Pitfalls:** In general, the oxalic removes fine-grained, powdery limonite or hematite deposits easily, but thick solid iron oxide crusts dissolve very slowly. Crystalline hematite patches become bright and shiny and dissolve very slowly. Oxalic acid is not good for cleaning specimens containing calcite or some other calcium minerals, as it dissolves these. Fluorite is not cleaned very well by oxalic acid and seems to be etched by it. Yellow stains can result if specimens are left in oxalic acid as it evaporates. (they should always remain completely covered by the acid.) Also, using too much baking soda to neutralize the acid can result in yellow staining.
